


Overview

Japan's popular arts, including anime, manga, music, fashion, and video games, is a multi-billion dollar industry with a passionate global audience. Yet, despite this success, the creative process behind it has yet to be academically or critically explored.

Further, Japan's popular arts have inspired a whole generation of young Americans to take their first steps into art and creativity. When a pencil and paper are given to students in middle school, high school, and college, over and over what is drawn is influenced by Japan.

The storytelling craft of Japan's popular arts has sparked lifelong passion in young Americans, and Foreign Exchange seeks to spotlight this influence and bridge between cultures.

Japan Society is a 100+ year old nonprofit organization in NYC focused on connecting the US and Japan. We have welcomed US Presidents, Japanese Prime Ministers, and Nobel Prize winners. We're based in landmarked headquarters one block from the United Nations.

Bronx-born **LeSean Thomas** is among the distinguished few Black Americans making their mark in the TV anime industry. He created and directed *Children of Ether, Cannon Busters*, and the critically acclaimed and NAACP Image Award-nominated Netflix series *Yasuke*.

The Imagination Project is a nonprofit that has worked with brands like Microsoft, Nike, and Spotify to create impactful initiatives that connect diverse youth with opportunities in Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, Media, Entrepreneurship, and Design.

Foreign Exchange does this through three primary methods:







DISCUSSIONS

Talks at Japan Society from creators about their careers in Japan's popular arts, including both public events and talks only for students, giving young artists a time to directly interact with and receive advice from creative professionals living their dream.

SCREENINGS

Curated screenings of US and Japanese media from our guest creators that include their own projects, works from their Japanese collaborators, and the works that inspired their careers to pass this excitement onto the next generation.

CLASSROOM VISITS

Creator visits to schools and libraries around NYC. These free talks and workshops are held in classrooms with a focus on underserved communities to directly connect with the audiences we can most meaningfully impact.

One live online panel for audiences nationwide.



This year's Foreign Exchange will welcome four culture-crossing curators as speakers and guests:









LeSean Thomas returns home to NYC to lead a week of classes and talks. His journey began with projects including *The Boondocks* and *Black Dynamite*. His talent expanded in Korea working on *The Legend of Korra*. And this paved the way for his move to Japan, where he created the anime *Children of Ether*, *Cannon Busters*, and *Yasuke*.

Justin Leach has over two decades of experience in the animation industry in the US and Japan. He's worked on projects including Ghost in the Shell 2, Kill Bill, Star Wars: The Clone Wars, and Kick-Heart. He's founder of Qubic Pictures and Co-Producer of Star Wars Visions at Lucasfilm and Netflix's Leviathan, both blending the US and Japan.

"Coach Mike" Peterson
was born in Brooklyn and is
an author, speaker, and
influencer. He's the founder
and CEO of The Imagination
Project and works to connect
young people in underserved
communities with education,
